

### Passports? Masks? The vaccination vexation!

After a youth spent attending many local churches, I eventually concluded that there were no absolutes - in the form of 'God'. The consequence: my beliefs had to survive on a 'floating foundation'. Then, for me, the logic of democracy indicates that 'truth' could be determined by counting heads - but only given the critical caveat: those heads must be adequately informed!

So far, the subsequent 60-odd years have proven my floating foundation to be quite adequate; so I've applied them to the latest conundrum: covid-19. This is quite a test: belief vs law, in the context of a number of unknowns!

In the naturist context we really only have legal issues for clubs, because on beaches we have just whatever the current 'law-colour' specifies.

The first relevant variable for clubs is their membership number versus the number attending on the grounds. At specified points those variables are, Red: 25, Orange: 100, Green: no limit.

Then there is the question of vaccine 'passports' - to use or not to use; that is the question.

Some assert that because naturism (by implied definition) is 'all inclusive'; a government issue passport is irrelevant. All that matters is one's own personal belief.

Otherwise stated, it's; faith: 'certainty of the unknown' versus science: 'uncertainty of the known'.

> But life is not easy for club executives! Mandate the official passports? Leave it to the members to come as they desire on the day?

Mandate or reject only the nonmembers: dependent on a passport, or independent of it?

# NUDISTS

The options are multiple, but some consequences are significant. If a club has say, a 30% non-disclosure of vaccination status - can that club afford to loose 30% of its income?

In the circumstances, Wendy's Federation decision to hand the choice to the clubs makes sense to me. (JL)

#### A wee note to the editor

With the magazine gone, one thing I feel is missing from the **gonatural** format, is a forum where the naturist community can write in to comment on published items; or express views about other subjects that may be of interest. So on that basis, please note this personal letter to all naturists in NZ and abroad.

My name is Constance. Some of you may know me. For those that don't, please allow me to fill you in. I'm in my tenth year as a member of the Wellington Naturist Club and over that time many would say I've been a contributing member. For example, I helped coordinate the 2017-2018 Pioneer Festival and I'm one of the coordinators of the 2022-2023 Carnivale Extravaganza Festival (See page 16.)

I have served on the committee for the past six years, mainly looking after the social portfolio and I've helped with cabin management, bookings and also had one year as VP. At the moment I am the Wellington Club President. I've also done two years on the NZNF Executive as Marketing Officer; but I relinquished that role at the recent AGM. I'm currently in charge of Social Media

It would be fair to say that the club and naturism in general has consumed a lot of my life this last decade. Let it be noted that I have done all of this willingly, voluntarily and out of love because I wanted to be involved and a part of the tribe. We naturists may be on the fringes of society but we are an amazing community with a unique spirit.

Until I discovered naturism, I had lived a rather transient nomadic existence for pretty much the whole of my adult life. My career choices and lack of familial obligations meant that I travelled a lot and rarely had a fixed abode; so when I stumbled across the WNC, it felt like I had finally come home.

I absolutely love being a naturist and I took to it like a duck to water and for the last six years I have had a caravan site on the grounds. My tiny abode is the closest thing (in today's current market) to a house that I may ever own.

I consider my van, the club and the pool to be my happy place; where I come (and try) to recharge my batteries, exercise, get my fix of vitamin D and socialise with friends, who over the years, have become like a family to me.

I was also drawn to the naturism ethos, described as "...a way of life in harmony with nature, expressed through social nudity, linked to self-respect, tolerance of differing views together with respect for the environment." Another key aspect of naturism is centred on individual health and well-being. This idea resonates with my approach to health and the way I take care of myself.

Not that my personal health information should be anybody's business but my own... I will share with you that aside from my recent brushes with breast cancer, I have never had the flu, rarely suffer a cold, but am occasionally afflicted by hay fever.

Despite also having a compromised immune system, first diagnosed in 1997, I have never let this slow me down. It was then that I made my careful choice to follow an alternative health regime. Now, I *can* trust my immune system!

So, it has been rather surprising to me that the government, who are politicians, and not medical professionals, have 1) pushed the vaccine as the only solution to this virus and 2) quashed information about how we can, as people take precautions, to reduce the viral load and perhaps lessen the need to go to hospital; should anyone contract Covid-19 and any of its variants.

I can't help but think that as naturists, we should be embracing this type of information, to help keep ourselves fit and healthy? I'm well into my fifties and to date I have not required medication of any description. Maybe it's in the genes, as my dad was 78 before he had to take anything. But it is alarming to note that many people my age, that I know of, do rely on a daily concoction of pills to help keep them going.

It has also been rather disappointing for me to see how the naturist clubs around the country and in particular the WNC have responded to this global pandemic, in light of the government imposed mandates and traffic light system on our nation. Sadly this has meant that clubs like ours have been forced to do the governments dirty work for them.

I know I'm an idealist, but I had really hoped that the naturist community would be able to withstand events in the outside world and remain impartial, inclusive, accepting, non-discriminatory, compassionate, empathetic and understanding and be respectful of people's choices, especially those that might not align with their own.

In creating our recent club Covid-19 policy, we took into consideration the fact that we had vulnerable members, particularly those of a certain age demographic or those with underlying health issues. Our biggest concern was around the safety of all our members and wanting to be inclusive of everyone, regardless of vaccination status.

I have to admit that the use of vaccine passports seems ludicrous to me, given the majority of New Zealand's population are already mingling in the workplace, family units and living arrangements, social events and gatherings, going to retail shops or the supermarket and catching public transport; like planes, trains, buses and ferries.

The vaccine free among us can and do all of the above, except get a haircut or eat out and in some extreme cases they are losing their jobs and livelihoods, all due to government mandates, which are not legally a law but a requirement only.

All the vaccine passport suggests to me is that you have been a compliant citizen who has dutifully received your two jabs and/or a booster: thus rewarded with a pass to participate in society.

It does not make you bulletproof and I would hate to see members become complacent because regardless of vaccination status, one is still able to contract or transmit the virus and easily pass Covid-19 onto vulnerable members who may believe they are safe at our clubs.

It concerns me that many people seem to be driven by fear and are looking at risk elimination instead of risk management. Personally, I'd have more confidence in a negative test result on arrival at a club as opposed to a digital pass.

If clubs were to adopt rapid antigen tests, those results would be available within 15-20 minutes. I consider this to be a more positive welcoming image for clubs to project instead of the intrusive nature of policing private medical information. With a level playing field we could also welcome back our vaccine free members, who should not be penalised by medical apartheid.

It would be great to see clubs united in their fight against this virus; places to be proud of, by not discriminating or endorsing such segregation. I can't speak for you, but for myself, the current situation goes totally against my morals, ethics and what I believe in and stand for.

It has been difficult for me to sit back and listen while a lot of people have tried to project fear or impose their own points of view. I can only liken it to an hysterical witch-hunt out there which is becoming increasingly abhorrent to me.

Our clubs are incredible sanctuaries. But I firmly believe that if we are to keep ALL of our members truly safe, so that we can ALL experience the health benefits of sunshine and fresh air; then I think that clubs need to bend the rules a little, take a stand and consider abolishing the use of vaccine passports for antigen tests instead. 

#### Jimmy's story

Everybody has a story as to how they came into naturism, or naturism found them - there are often commonalities which people share (at the right time) - the result being to encourage other people to give it a try if there is a connection for them or an experience that may have shaped them at a young age.

I was no different from other children growing up - I remember the freedom of being naked in a paddling pool - with photographic evidence to prove this! And then from there, if there was a chance to be clothes-free in the right environment I took it!

I remember staying at a friend's place in the country - his Mum game out into the garden with nothing on, to sunbathe and read a book - she simply said 'take your clothes off boys if you want to' and we did - and continued to play as before but without clothes - cowboys & Indians as it would have been at the time.

And it all felt perfect and okay to me!

From then onwards in the summer months if the opportunity arose to be clothes free I would take it - I even recall a friend's parents having copies of Health & Efficiency magazine in their house, which I found fascinating - here were pictures of people at beaches and camping grounds doing exactly what I longed to do.

Time marches on. Secondary school arrives and I learned that it was not everybody's cup of tea to be clothes free when the moment or mood arose - but it was very comforting to learn that some people of my age shared my view. I had a cousin who had a similar perspective - especially when it came to swimming. When we stayed at their bach we would go well past the end of the road and around the point at the end of the beach to go swimming - it was really wonderful to be in the ocean unencumbered by togs.

(Do we lack a private beach, with controlled entry, in Aotearoa? I have been to a few clothing optional beaches as an adult - unfortunately they seem to attract the wrong type of people at different times - if my lotto numbers come in I'll buy some access and set up a camping ground etc. - the beach and naturism are perfect partners in my view)

At that time I would go to a neighbour's place to do what most rural kids would do - eeling, possum hunting and ride horses. But after a hot day in the sun we would jump in their pool - but with togs on. Although that didn't stop their Mum hopping in without togs! I wanted to join in but often there were other siblings in attendance so it may have made for somewhat awkward conversations with parents...

Leaving school and working lead me into sport: rugby and cricket, and it was interesting, particularly with rugby, how all the chaps back then, showered together without the blink of eye - the most natural thing to do and it makes a lot of sense. Now though, my understanding is that most shower in their underpants; not judging - each to their own, but it is a contradiction in my view, given that we are living in what appears to be a more liberal time, as evidenced by television programmes like "Naked Attraction". (The best part of this programme is the fact that it makes the point that being different is normal.)

As my interest in naturism continued I purchased the NZNaturist (now **gonatural**) magazine and the occasional H & Emagazine to understand a wider view of Naturism. I also enjoyed the television programme Nude Zealand. (It was funny how a number of conservative family members watched the programme and said they would never go naked in front of other people, yet they made the point of watching the programme!)

Although I managed to be clothes free at different opportunities, I still wanted to experience what it would be like at a place specifically set up for clothes-free recreation. We never want to look in the rear vision mirror and say; should've, could've, didn't; so I emailed the HB Naturist Club to arrange a visit.

I could not speak more highly of the whole experience from the prompt and courteous initial email exchange (thank you Jody!) to Bob showing me around.

As to the day itself - I found myself in Hawkes Bay on a day that suited so I phoned ahead to clear it with Bob. I got myself slightly lost on the way - I should have Googled it!

As I entered the gates, I thought - this is it! Smiled at the big welcome sign - drove to the car park - hardly anyone there! Heart racing a little!

After parking my vehicle, I went for a walk to find Bob. I was greeted by a friendly chap - naked clearly - which for a millisecond, threw me. But then, hang on, isn't that what I'm here for?

He directed me to Bob, who gave me a full, guided tour of Rapere and all its delights - then he left me to it!

I went to my car - disrobed - apart from jandals and a water bottle and cap - then went straight to the pool and had the most wonderful swim I could imagine - with the whole pool to myself.

I went for an exploratory walk. It was like stepping back to a bygone era - no phones or noise. It seemed that nature was connecting with me in a way I didn't think possible! To feel the breeze over my whole body, in touch with all my senses; is something that has to be experienced to understand.

I met another chap who was doing some maintenance - we chatted away and it was like we were both really present - 100% focussed on what the other person was saying.

I then introduced myself to another gentlemen who had just arrived - we talked about a lot of things. That we weren't wearing clothes seemed to make it perfectly natural.

I loved my time at Rapere - it reminded me of the time when there was a real sense of community, that people wanted to connect for the sake of being people and to enjoy the wonderful delights of clothes-free recreation and all its associated benefits.

I have had a reset of my view on life, in no small way due to the day at Rapere, as well as the world being in the state that it is in. And my angle is this: I used to be chasing a corporate dream that was always unattainable, wanting to be part of a race on a treadmill to goodness knows where, looking for the answer to a question - but I didn't know what the question was...

My visit helped accept where I am - right here, right now, is just where I want to be. I don't want any of the corporate rubbish that goes with trying to create as much shareholder return as you can!

I am enjoying a slower, mindful life and enjoying people for who they are and how they treat others... So if you are reading this, thinking 'I would like to have a go' but are hesitant... go during the week... chances are there won't be many, if any; people there... and I can guarantee you this you will be counting your sleeps until your next visit - I know I am... # South African traditional cultures struggle against online censorship

I remember speaking to a Zulu colleague of mine in Johannesburg, South Africa back in 2008 expressing his frustration at having his Facebook account blocked because he uploaded his wedding pictures. Why? Because they included cultural clothes which featured topless women. The traditional dress of many African cultures feature bare-breasted males and females. Despite multiple protests over many years, it seems little has really changed when it comes to online censorship.

Prof. Bhuyeni from the Zulu Cultural Heritage Centre says: "It boils down to cultural discrimination. The internet and social media giants are imposing Western cultural ideals on traditional African cultures. As Zulu's, we consider female breasts and nipples as natural, but it's Western cultures that have sexualised a woman's breasts. Whilst YouTube has conceded on some grounds and for some channels, we are still struggling with the everyday reality where Africans want to share pictures or videos of a wedding or birthday or celebration on social media and are having their accounts blocked. Or even worse, having their pictures falsely labelled as child pornography where bare breasted girls are in puberty. It's even worse these days because censorship used to be done by human agents who could apply a degree of common sense. Now it's all automated algorithms, and the algorithms seem to target large breasted women more than small breasted women, and darker nipples more than lighter nipples - hence worse for black women."

She adds, "Mothers are telling me that they struggle to get their daughters interested in traditional dancing and traditional clothes, because for the younger generations - if they can't share something on YouTube or TikTok or Instagram... well, then they simply aren't interested. It also makes them question their own values in favour of Western beliefs. So this relentless and senseless censorship is becoming a direct threat to our culture. It prevents Zulu - and other African cultures - from moving forward, and modernising with technology. It's a very serious issue that deserves more attention".
